Dear Friends,

Growing up in a Baptist church, some of the hymns we sang repeatedly, and which I remember to this day, are included in the Episcopal Church's African American Hymnal, "Lift Every Voice and Sing" (LEVAS for short). At Atonement, we often have inserts in the bulletin with hymns from LEVAS or one of the other supplemental hymnals of the Episcopal Church.

We sang "Out in the Highways and Byways" as our final hymn on Sunday, July 14. It connects to the Gospel, which includes Jesus' teaching to love God and neighbor, and his telling of the parable of the Good Samaritan.

The hymn reminds us of our calling to be a blessing to another. The last verse is, "Give as 'twas given to you in your need, Love as the Master loved you; Be to the helpless a helper in need, Unto your mission be true. Make me a blessing..." I like the way the hymn operates: each verse speaks to the one who is singing, reminding him or her of how they've been blessed, and of the great need for love in the world. Then the refrain encourages the singers' response: "Make ME a blessing..." It reminds me of this quote:

Miss no single opportunity of making some small sacrifice, here by a smiling look, there by a kindly word; always doing the smaller right and doing it all for love.

FROM THE RECTOR (Continued)

What is the "smaller right" for each of us? What is the blessing we can bestow on a neighbor, a co-worker, a homebound parishioner, a hungry child, a stranger by the side of the road? It may be a listening ear, a kind word, a can of soup...or perhaps hosting a Blessings Booth...?!

Yes, we're entering the second year of our new ministry, "Blessings to Go." Born of our 150th Anniversary brainstorming, we've taken our Blessings Booth to the Tenafly Community Night, Earth Fairs, Veteran's Day and Memorial Day ceremonies, Pride marches, and the Englewood Farmers' Market. The purpose of the "Blessings to Go" ministry isn't to convert anyone, or even to cultivate potential new members (although both would be a good thing). The purpose of this ministry is simply to bless.

As we brainstormed, one of the questions was, "How do we reach out to our community, to honor this anniversary?" We knew that many secular organizations do good works – feeding the hungry, caring for the homeless and the refugee – and that Atonement was already supporting many of those groups.

But...what was one important thing that we could offer, that other organizations, doing other good and important things, couldn't do? The answer: offer spiritual support, encouragement, healing, and/or prayer for those who might need these things.

One way to be a blessing to others is to volunteer to help host the Blessings Booth for an hour or two this summer or in the fall. (We have printed interfaith Blessing Cards, so you don't have to come up with a blessing prayer on the spot – just read the card!) I hope you'll consider taking this opportunity to be a blessing. You can contact Birgitta Karlén, Tanya Quirk, Fran Regan or me if you have any questions, or would like to volunteer. Our next dates are at the Englewood Farmer's Market on August 9 and 16, and then the Tenafly Community Night on September 17.

More importantly though, to be a blessing to others is something we can do any day, at almost any time, anywhere. It extends beyond our immediate neighbor, outwards to our community, our nation, and our world. We can be an agent of blessing when we help someone right next to us, and also when we thoughtfully and prayerfully consider how our mission plays itself out in terms of social, economic and political policy. These are areas where we may disagree about the details – sometimes significantly – but never disagree about the aim – to love, to serve, to help, to heal, and to seek what is good and just for those who are in need.

A parishioner recently told me that she learned two things from her early church experience that she tries to live by: "Be ye kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another..." (Ephesians 4:32 – and coincidentally – part of the choir anthem text for the anniversary Evensong on June 2), and "Make me a sunbeam" (a Sunday School song). Perhaps this summer is as good a time as any to increase our attentiveness to those around us,

and to respond with a tender heart.

WHAT'S NEW WITH ATONEMENT'S ENVIRONMENTAL MINISTRY?

Members of Atonement recently participated in the protest, "Save Our Lungs," opposing the controversial proposed power plant in the Meadowlands, which drew hundreds of protesters to Ridgefield High School on May 18. The march was organized by local high school students from across the county in partnership with the environmental organizations Sierra Club and Food and Water Watch to rally against another gas-fired power plant in an area already graded an "F" for clean air by the America Lung Association.

Looking ahead, the long-awaited draft of the State of New Jersey Energy Master Plan has just been released. This document is supposed to be the blueprint to get NJ to 100% clean energy by 2050 to avoid climate catastrophe. Also coming up, Creation Season begins on Sunday, October 4 – when we celebrate the Blessing of the Animals, honoring Francis of Assisi – and ends on Thanksgiving Day. During October and November, we incorporate prayers and hymns appropriate to the season in worship, and also invite at least one special speaker. The Environmental Committee leads a "putting the garden to sleep" event for our young people. The committee is also planning an Eco-cruise, or a cleanup day in conjunction with GreenFaith and Hackensack River Keeper for a date yet to be determined in September, so stayed tuned for information on that. "Making change – Make a Difference" Feeds our Hungry Neighbors!

During Lent, Atonement again participated in the District 9 Lenten Offering, this year earmarked for Center for Food Action, a local organization we know well and have supported for many years with food and financial assistance.

During Lent, our "Making Change – Make a Difference" change jars added up to \$569.81. Thanks to everyone who participated, and to our Confirmation Class for presenting the challenge on the First Sunday in Lent!

One or two parishioners have told me that they have a change jar that they weren't able to bring in on time. That's OK! Bring in your offerings and Mike Murphy, our Treasurer, will make sure the money gets to CFA to help feed our hungry neighbors in Bergen County. And don't forget to continue to bring in shelf-stable food during the summer – when the shelves tend to run bare. You can drop off food 24/7 in the Chapel narthex.

Altogether, the eight Episcopal Churches in Northeastern Bergen County that adopted this joint campaign during Lent 2019 has raised \$5,038.81.

In past years, Atonement and the other D9 churches have raised \$5,000 or more for Episcopal schools in Liberia, a well for a drought-stricken town through Episcopal Relief & Development, and last year for Episcopal schools in the hurricane-damaged U.S. Virgin Islands.


In 2018 we began a five year project to replace the roof in stages. Last year we replaced the section over the main altar. In June of this year we replaced the roof over the chapel. By doing it in sections we can spread the cost out and have a better chance of getting five smaller diocesan Ward J. Herbert Fund grants to help rather than one large grant. The Fund board (consisting of clergy and laity) approved our grant requests for nearly half of the cost of the 2018 and 2019 projects, and Atonement paid the balance.

Next year we plan to tackle the roof over the main church – a much larger project – and we'll keep you informed and ask for your help as we move forward. The goal of Building & Grounds Committee is to be proactive by staying in front of repairs in order to better manage a little bit every year and avoid any crisis.

ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting was held on May 5 where the Annual Report was distributed to the attending congregation. Rector Lynne Weber welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked all the members of the parish who had a role in making the church year a success.

Lynne gave a brief overview of the events and projects the church has been working on to commemorate Atonement's 150th Anniversary. She also gave special thanks to the outgoing members of the vestry, including Senior Warden Roberta Roshong and two-term Newcomers Chair Tracey Preolo.

The year kicked off with our 2018 Arts & Music Festival and with a parish barbeque on the front lawn in September. We instituted our "Blessings to Go" ministry which showed up in various locations and events including Tenafly's first Pride Day, 2018 Earth Day Fair at Northern Valley High School, and the farmers markets in Englewood and Tenafly.

A major project is the restoration of Ella Condie Lamb's painting An Advent Angel, spearheaded by Wilson Reimers. Fundraising for the project exceeded expectations. In addition to a series of three beautiful services of Evensong, the highlight of the year-long celebration was the Dinner Dance.

Several reports were given at the Annual Meeting involving the church's finances, and Buildings & Grounds projects, including the five-year roof plan.

The most important business at the meeting was to elect new leadership. The Nominating Committee nominated Carol Petrovich and Fran Regan to serve two-year terms as Senior Warden and Junior Warden, respectively; and John Hancock, Denise Peirce and Bryon Roshong to serve three-year terms as Vestry members. The following members were also nominated to serve as Deputies and Alternates to the District 9 and to the 2019 Diocesan Convention:

Deputies: Warden, Fran Regan; Vestry, Wilson Reimers; At-Large, Tracey Preolo Alternates: Warden, Carol Petrovich; Vestry, Andrea Pieper; At-Large, Ralph Messina

No nominations were offered from the floor and the slate was elected unanimously. The Rector thanked the members for agreeing to serve.

Before adjournment, resolutions of courtesy were passed, to send greetings to former rector and bishop Jack Croneberger, former priest in charge Charlie Lochner, and former bishop Mark Beckwith.
